Endoscopy means to look inside and **Laparoscopy** refers to minimally invasive surgery of the abdominal cavity. Instead of a traditional, large, "open" incision, only two or three small incisions are made. The abdomen is distended with carbon dioxide and a small series of lenses (scope) attached to a camera is used to give high definition, detailed images of organs. Small instruments are used to manipulate, biopsy or cauterize tissues.

What procedures can be performed laparoscopically?

Frequently performed laparoscopic surgeries include:

- Liver biopsy, renal biopsy
- Ovariectomy and ovariohysterectomy
- Laparoscopic assisted gastro-intestinal biopsy
- Gastropexies (used to prevent stomach torsion)
- Feeding tube placement

Other applications:

- Adrenal tumor removal
- Gall bladder removal
- Kidney removal

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PRIOR TO SURGERY

You will meet with the surgeon and discuss specific details related to your pet's needs. Pre-anesthetic blood work is generally required within 2 weeks of surgery to ensure the safest possible anesthesia. **No food is to be given after 8pm the night prior to surgery.**







AFTER SURGERY

Your pet will be given pain medications and, as needed, intravenous fluids overnight until your pet is eating and drinking voluntarily. Patients are closely monitored at all times by a veterinary technician and a doctor is present 24 hours a day.





Most pets go home the day after surgery. Exercise is restricted to house confinement, with short leash walks for bathroom breaks 2-3 times per day. An e-collar will be provided to prevent your pet licking or chewing at the sutures or staples which have been placed in the skin.

Ten to fourteen days after surgery your pet will be rechecked by the surgeon.

Anesthesia Risks and Complications

In both humans and animals there are always anesthetic risks including the potential for an unexpected fatality. However, these risks are extremely low. If you choose laparoscopy the surgeon will endeavor to perform the procedure in a minimally invasive manner but if there is an unexpected finding or complication, the surgeon will convert to a traditional "open" procedure as necessary.

Complications during laparoscopy are rare and vary depending on the procedure being performed. The most common complication is redness and bruising around the incision sites, which resolves within 10-14 days.
